Global Entrepreneur II Certificate of Achievement spans all stages of small business development, from defining an idea to finding and managing finances to building marketing strategies and managing an operation. The program provides analysis of the conditions in which entrepreneurs utilize their creativity and innovation to meet consumer demands in diverse markets and students will understand the personal and professional challenges entrepreneurial leaders, particularly minorities, face.

## 2. Provide a brief rationale for the program.



A few years ago LASC participated in the Goldman-Sachs 10,000 Business Initiative, which more recently has evolved on campus into CEO-Center for Entrepreneurial Opportunities, supported from mini-grant awards by the DSN for Small Business Entrepreneurship. The demand for entrepreneurial activities, training and curriculum was evidenced by the attendance of 400 women at the first Women's Entrepreneur Leadership Conference hosted by CEO at Southwest College. We have also introduced the Small Business Institute for high school and college students on campus and co-hosted a StartUP Weekend Los Angeles event as the first education institution in the world to host this event, with corporate sponsors as Google, Coca-Cola, Black Silicon Valley, Vent-Labs and others.

Additionally, our Career Center tracks job activity through our internet-based College Central Network and the majors sought by employers posting jobs at our site exclusively is led by majors in Small Business Entrepreneurship. This curriculum will provide students with the practical skills needed to develop small business opportunities and market products/services on a global scale.

Entrepreneurs and small business owners are critical to California's economic development as contributors to innovation and new job growth. Additionally, these individuals provide local business revenue, create networks, invest in local projects, and support community efforts.

The Kauffman Foundation reports in its Entrepreneur Index Study that California is 5th in the Nation for entrepreneurial growth and 2nd for overall entrepreneurial activity. California's small businesses comprise 98% of all businesses in the state; provides 82% of the private sector jobs, and 75% of the gross state product. There are 468,903 small business employers in California and these employers hire over 50% of the workforce. The Los Angeles Orange County Region represents 167,921 (36%) of the small businesses that employ 515,398 employees (which represents 37% of 1,408,098 small business employment) Doing What Matters Small Business Sector Profile.
